#### Anthrozoös Featured Articles


"Speciesism Predicts Prejudice Against Low-Status and Hierarchy-Attenuating Human Groups" by Lynn Jackson, Kings University College at The University of Western Ontario, Canada

This study showed that college undergraduates with stronger speciesism reported less favorable attitudes toward low-status groups (e.g., First Nations people) and people who tend to advocate for changes in social hierarchy (e.g., feminists).

"Milkmaid Bears and Savage Mates: The Cultural Exploitation of Real and Fictive White Bears from the Elizabethan Period to the Present" by Judith Woolf, University of York, UK

The paper takes "nanoq: flat out and bluesome", an art project in which taxidermic polar bears in the UK were located and photographed, as the starting point for a discussion of the use of bears, especially white bears, in literary works from the 16th century onwards. Symbolic or anthropomorphic bears were a common trope in drama and fiction, while real bears were exploited in bear pits, theatres, circuses and zoos, as well as in their natural habitats.
